The 11th N.J. Yasaswy Memorial Lecture 24th November, 2022 IFHE Auditorium



ICFAI Foundation for Higher Education (IFHE), Hyderabad held the 11th N J Yasaswy memorial lecture on November 24, 2022. Former union minister and six time parliament member, Suresh Prabhu delivered the lecture on 'Realizing Yasaswy's Vision'.

N J Yasaswy was the founder of the ICFAI Group of Educational Institutions and promoted higher education in the private sector for over three decades. During the lecture, Suresh Prabhu said: "Heroes need not be politicians, business leaders, or those who wear a uniform. Leaders build sustainable societies and develop individuals. Yasaswy was a leader who dreamt of building modern India through quality education."

Talking about the role of education, Prabhu added that education is necessary to develop as an individual, discover oneself, and realize one's potential. He emphasized the role of quality education and outcome-oriented education. Seminar on Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace with Special Reference to Educational Institutions in India

A seminar was Presented by Assistant Professor **Nirja Agarwal** on the topic 'Sexual Harassment', on 6th December 2022. Sexual Harassment, one of the evils of the modern society which is deeply rooted in society. The Harassment takes place



at every workplace starting from schools, colleges, and universities to offices. Women nowadays are not safe anywhere, they are facing sexual harassment everywhere. The evil of sexual harassment is a major problem in almost every country, and its incidence is increasing day by day.

The Sexual Harassment of Women at the Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013, asserted rights of women to a safe working environment. However, over the years, it was observed that there was severe non-compliance to the Act in the educational institutions in India. It was seen that employers did not constitute Internal Complaint Committee as per the Act and also did not fulfill other obligations as stated in the Act. Even after the SAKSHAM Report 2013, The University Grant Commission (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of Sexual harassment of women employees and students in higher educational institutions) Regulations 2015 and The All India Council for Technical Education (Gender. Sensitization, Prevention and Prohibition of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and students and Redressal of grievances in Technical Institutions) Regulations, 2016, the employers failed to comply with it. In India, as per the National Crime Record Bureau, the cases of Sexual

harassment of women at in workplace showed a declining trend, the number of cases was 21,938 in the year 2013 and decreased to 17,539 in the year 2021. A study of those factors which helped in decreasing the crime has not been done.

A study has been made in the Educational Institutions in Delhi NCR showed that there are sexual harassment cases in the educational institutions also but many of the students are not aware about the laws related to sexual harassment. Such type of study is required in other cities and states in the country. There is a need to study the phenomena of sexual harassment in the educational institutions in India and check these crimes at the grass roots level.

She Teams Brand Awareness and Effectiveness for Women’s Safety: An Empirical Study in Hyderabad

The widely discussed gang rape in December 2012 in New Delhi (The capital of India) marked a significant moment in the public discourse around women’s safety and sexual violence in India. A number of studies were done on violence on women (Agnes, 1998), sexual violence Carrington & Watson (1996), and policy response on SHE TEAMS’ Raman & Komarraju (2018). A number of testimonials and media reports show that SHE TEAMS have positively changed the behavior of eve-teasers apart from curbing down the crime against women on the streets. However, not much empirical research is conducted on public awareness and experience with the SHE TEAMS’ initiatives.

Telangana state has approached the issue of women’s safety steadily, systematically, and strategically. Two initiatives, SHE TEAMS (established in 2014) and BHAROSA (established in 2016), have succeeded in achieving that rarely attainable goal – building people’s trust in its police and especially the trust of women. Even the name – ‘SHE’ stands for ‘Security for Her Ensured’ – gives out a sense of calm and collected confidence, and generates faith.

There were a total of 100 SHE TEAMS in 2017-18. Each SHE TEAM consisted of a Sub Inspector, one lady constable, and two or three male constables. SHE TEAMS of the Hyderabad police registered 3,516 cases of harassment against women in the state, since its inception in 2014. The police teams said that they caught 1,400 persons red-handed. In an official press release, police informed that the teams have imprisoned 20 percent of the accused, levied a penalty against 80 per cent, while 950 others were let off after being counseled (The News Minutes, 2017). SHE TEAM member, Assistant Commissioner of Police, D Kavitha, said that the harassment against women at public places has gradually reduced after the entry of SHE TEAMS in 2014.

SHE team’s wing had stopped as many as 24 child marriages and booked 629 suspects, who were caught red-handed for harassing women. Fear of repercussions and lack of confidence about timely intervention prevent many women from lodging complaints against offenders.

With the advent of SHE TEAMS the confidence of help on hand, timely action and punishment of offenders has gone up and women can step out with confidence. The effectiveness of

SHE TEAMS thus needs to be communicated far and wide so as to safeguard the women in our society and to enable them to have a better life.

SHE TEAMS, women-oriented measures by the Telangana Government will act as role model for other states to emulate and take similar initiatives. The social media platforms such as Twitter, Facebook, and Whatsapp were a convenient way for the victims to reach out to the 'SHE' teams, as the identity of the victims remained anonymous. Advantage of social media is that the complaints are received and acted upon very quickly by the 'SHE' teams which results in the victim's satisfaction. 'SHE' team also went into collaboration with the 'HAWK EYE' mobile app of Hyderabad City police for ensuring women safety.

The main aim of the SHE TEAMS is to provide safety and security to women who are at home and working in different professions. It encourages women to go out with confidence, dignity and with their self-respect intact. No college going student or woman should suffer disrespect through vulgar comments made by offenders or feel humiliated, belittled or scared by obscene gestures, language or misbehavior. SHE TEAMS seek to instill confidence in women to stand up and speak out against offenders so that their safety is not compromised upon.

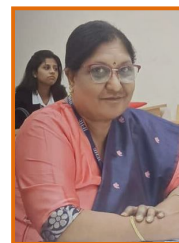
SHE TEAMS also aims to correct misguided youth and make them aware of the consequences of teasing women which may seem heroic to them. Apart from booking cases against offenders SHE teams should take up counseling of first time offenders and minor boys so that they realize their mistakes and turn a new leaf. Counseling should be arranged for the family members of juveniles. Once there is a change among these youth, they help the SHE TEAMS by spreading awareness about the need to respect women as fellow members of the society and not look at them as objects of pleasure or ridicule.

Since the SHE TEAMS associate with a cause that requires both responsiveness and sensitivity towards the victims. The findings of the present study will help SHE TEAMS how to further improve on its awareness and experience making this initiative more successful. Future research can be extended to only women centric views across different age groups on SHE TEAMS working pattern.

Impact of the Historic Judicial Trends on the Women's Right to Abortion in India and USA

In its landmark judgment, the Supreme Court of India, granted equal rights to bodily autonomy to unmarried women on par with married women in the case of X vs. The Principal Secretary Health, on 29th of September 2022. The judgment is highly applauded by the women rights activists since it upholds the 'reproductive autonomy' of women.



Interestingly, this significant development in the Indian abortion laws happened soon after the US Supreme Court took a shocking regressive step of depriving the American women of their constitutional right to abortion, by overruling Roe vs. Wade, (1973). This historic ruling influenced the reproductive rights of women everywhere for almost half a century. These two directly opposing decisions, brought the perpetually debated 'the right to abortion' to the headlines once again. This article intends to analyze the impact of the historic judicial trends on the abortion rights of women as well as on the families and the society. At the outset, it presents some important phases in abortion regulation, and the development of the right to abortion in India, and USA. It also includes a discussion on the development of 'right to privacy'. The paper ends with some concluding remarks and suggestions.

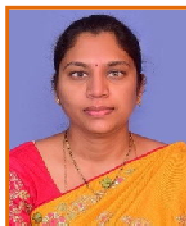
Women Empowerment

When women are empowered, whole family benefits and these benefits often have ripple effects on the future generations. The situation of women will only improve if the mentality of our society is changed.

Educating girls and making them aware about their rights may bring a long lasting change in the society. Lastly, efforts should be made to restructure the legal process to deliver fair and in-time justice for crime against women.

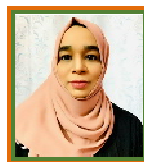

Thesis Defence: Synthesis, Characterization and Study of Thermal Properties of Compounds, Composites and Complexes of Cobalt'

Name of the Scholar: **Swapna Samala**

Date: 14th November 2022.

Abstract: The work focuses on the synthesis of compounds, composite materials and highly hindered complexes of cobalt and studies their thermal and catalytic properties. Phosphate containing mixtures of cobalt compounds were synthesized in two different forms viz. calcined and non- calcined form along with their composite materials and complexes with highly hindered chelating ligands. Syntheses of these mixtures have been carried out in atmospheric conditions and are characterized by various analytical techniques Thermal study was carried out by using Differential Scanning Calorimetry (DSC).

The composite materials were synthesized by mixing both calcined as well as non-calcined materials with building coating materials such as wall care putty, decorating paint, solar paint, CaCO₃, adhesive glue and solar black paint. Study of thermal properties of composite materials has been studied in two different thermal cycles.

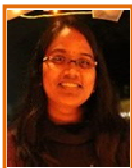

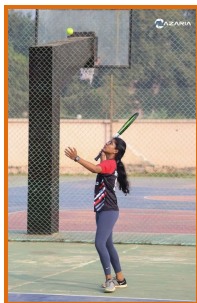
